Masks: Unless otherwise directed by local health departments or local educational agencies, students and staff should follow <u>CDPH masking guidance</u> for the general public, as well as masking guidance in the <u>CDPH</u> <u>COVID-19/K-12-Guidance-2023-24-School-Year</u> and <u>Get the Most Out of</u> <u>Masking: Tips & Resources</u> . Child and adult-sized masks will continue to be available at all school and district facilities.

Physical distancing: Physical distancing is no longer a requirement, but may be practiced when appropriate.

Handwashing and respiratory etiquette: Frequent hand washing, including upon entering the classroom, before meals and after using the restroom, is encouraged throughout the day. Respiratory etiquette is also encouraged throughout the day. Hand sanitizers and handwashing stations are available at all sites.

Cleaning and maintaining healthy facilities: Staff will follow CDC and CDPH guidelines for cleaning and disinfecting. Only EPA approved products will be used to disinfect.

Contact tracing: The California Department of Public Health has issued new requirements regarding the management of COVID on school campuses for employees. Contact Tracing is no longer required as of March 10th, 2023. Students should follow the protocols listed here if they are experiencing symptoms related to COVID-19. Diagnostic screening and testing: All students, staff and visitors are recommended to self-screen for symptoms prior to entering campus. COVID-19 tests will be readily available for students and staff at school sites and central office. There are also several places in Kern County that offer testing.

Vaccines: GPS recognizes that vaccination is effective at preventing COVID-19, protecting against both transmission and serious illness or death. Vaccinations are free to anyone who would like to receive them.

Coordination with state and local health officials: District staff will continue to work closely with all new guidance and regulations that come from state and local health officials. District staff regularly receive information from local health officials to keep the district updated on the most current information. The district reports information about COVID-19 cases, and provides related information as requested, to the KCDPH and other governmental agencies, including Cal/OSHA, when requested, as required by law.
